News has been received of the death at his son's residence in Invercargill of Mr David Hay at the age of 75 years. Mr Hay was a very old resident of Oamaru, having arrived here in 1861 with his parents and family. He resided here continuously until a couple of years ago, when he removed to Invercargill. The deceased gentleman took an active and intelligent interest in public affairs. For some time he served as a Borough Councillor, but he was best known in connection with the administration of the Oamaru Hospital, with which he was for long years associated as a trustee. He was a very old member of the Phoenix Bowling Club and generally played well his part in the social life of the community. He was also closely connected with the business and industrial activities of North Otago, his most prominent association therewith being as a proprietor of the Kakanui flour-mills. Personally Mr Hay was a man to be admired—unassuming, gracious in manner, and ready to oblige.
